October 20: Finalized results of focus groups, School Committee input and online survey results for Successful Candidate Profile, to be used by screening committee

November 1: Ms. Kyle Conley officially extended offers to join the Screening Committee

December 4: The screening committee will review applicants and determine who to interview

Between December 11 and 15: The screening committee will Interview candidates

January 2: The School Committee will receive an orientation prior to interviews with the final candidates

Between January 8 and 12: Final Interviews with School Committee











Use Emojis to Help Organize Google Classroom





Did you know that you can embed emojis into text almost anywhere on Google Classroom? Emojis can be helpful when organizing topics and assignments, but they can also be useful when posting comments and messages too!

To add emojis, right click (or double finger tap a trackpad) in a text field to bring up a context sensitive menu. The emoji menu should appear at the top. Next, enter the emoji menu and select an emoji to insert. Google periodically adds new emojis to choose from!





Here's an example of a topic that has an emoji added:

IEP Improvement Project

The Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has confirmed full implementation of the the new IEP form for the 2024-2025 school year.

The Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education has released grant monies to support districts in the implementation of the new IEP format.

To foster consistent implementation of the new IEP format, we are establishing a committee of professionals to support one another by developing the protocols that work for our district.

This committee will include 6-8 staff from varied grade levels and areas of expertise. Should there be more interest than available spots, participants will be chosen based on their area of expertise and grade level in order to create a balanced team. Educators will be compensated at the contract rate for their participation. General education teachers are encouraged to participate.

Please share your interest <u>here</u> before <u>November 10</u> for grant planning. Committee work will start in January.

We have done much work to prepare for this new IEP form including:

- Consistent use of parent input forms prior to each initial, reeval, annual meeting. This information is included in team meeting notes and the IEP.
- Consistent use of student interviews prior to each initial, reeval and annual meeting.

- Training specific to goal writing and progress monitoring.

Professional Development Committee

The PD Committee consisting of Nancy LeBlanc, Erin O'Duggan, Faith Martin, Anna Wilson, Kate McMurdie, Kesley Quinn, Teddi Cowden, Judy Kuehn, Christine Cappadona, and Kristen Ryan met on October 25. The agenda for our meeting consisted of an in-depth analysis of the professional development (PD) programs that have been conducted across the district over the past five years. We also brainstormed a list of potential topics for future PD sessions. The atmosphere in the room was a sense of enthusiasm and positivity emanating from every member of the group.



We are excited to announce that our district has adopted the use of IXL in grades 6 through 12, specifically for content areas in English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. IXL is an innovative and effective online educational platform designed to support and enhance student learning experience in these critical subjects. IXL will serve as a supplemental resource for both in-class and at-home learning. Teachers may assign specific IXL exercises to complement classroom instruction, reinforce learning, and prepare for assessments. This tool will also be available for independent study and practice.

The three Spanish teachers are currently piloting a new Spanish curriculum, Encuentros.
