ATHLETICS

Beginning this spring at Hull High School, we will have a number of new procedures and systems in place to help enhance our student athletes' overall athletic experience. Included will be a Code of Conduct for parents/guardians, pre-season coaches meetings between coaches and the Athletic Director, and a mandatory Sports Night for each season. During our Sports Night, parents/guardians will have the opportunity to review the Code of Conduct and speak with the coaches, athletic director, athletic trainer, and other parents/guardians of that season.

Why have a parent meeting?

1. Provide advance communication that is timely and upbeat.
2. Explain how parents/guardians are leaders and need to lead from the stands.
3. Distribute and explain expectations and consequences.
4. Have students explain what is proper conduct.
5. Review the privileges and disciplines of athletics.
6. Have all students and parents sign a Code of Conduct.



These are all aimed towards the ultimate goal of providing the most beneficial years of athletics at Hull High School for every student athlete. The Code of Conduct for the parents will touch on things such as, our Pirate philosophy, respect, coach communication guide, and expectations of parents/guardians while attending Hull High School athletic events. The goal for our Sports Night is to review the Code of Conduct, gather information for the upcoming season, and discuss travel, schedule, and outlook on the year.

Elementary Literacy Curriculum Review Update

Our first pilot with Amplify Core Knowledge Language Arts (*CKLA*) curriculum materials wrapped up on March 3. The five-week pilot allowed teachers and students to experience the curriculum materials. While teaching with the *CKLA* materials, teachers used a rubric to analyze and record their feedback. Because students' voice is important at all levels, our Director of Curriculum and Assessment, Christine Cappadona, first-grade teacher Lindsey Rajan, and Special Educator Emily Rosado visited classrooms to survey students about what they liked and disliked about *CKLA*. Our literacy committee met to review the data collected, ask questions, and share the strengths and challenges of the *CKLA* curriculum. The same process is now being closely followed with our second curriculum pilot, using McGraw-Hill Education, *Wonders*. Teachers received training during our early release on March 8 and have used *Wonders* for the past four weeks. This second pilot wraps up this Friday, April 14. Following the April vacation, our literacy committee will work to reach a consensus. While both materials being "tested" are high quality and fully aligned to the state standards, we are identifying the best match for our students and teachers. We will continue to update families with our process.

Families with MassHealth need to renew their coverage this year in order to maintain coverage. Coverage protections put in place during the pandemic will end soon, and MassHealth will return to standard annual eligibility renewal processes.

Please help inform MassHealth families that they need to take the following steps:

- **Update contact information** – make sure MassHealth has their most up-to-date address, phone number, and email so they do not miss important information and notices about what else is needed.
- **Report household changes** to make sure MassHealth knows about any changes in their household, like a new job, address, changes to income, disability status, or pregnancy.

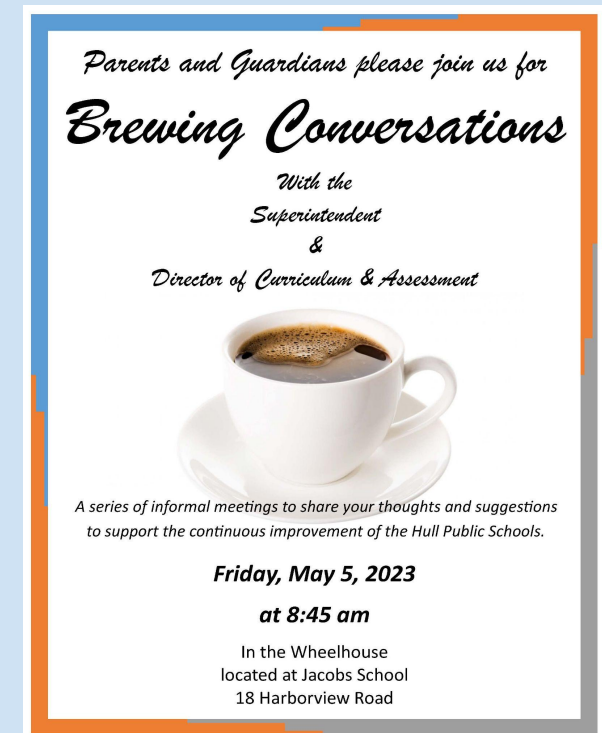

Over the years, I have reached out to parents/guardians to ask for your assistance with issues related to how students use technology and the internet. In the past I have reached out about the dangers of social media challenges such as the milk crate challenge or the tide pod challenge. Another issue that resurfaces from time to time is the use of anonymous communication apps such as Discord, Yik Yak, Holla, or Meetme and the poor decisions that students sometimes make with what they choose to post.

There are two results that may occur when students use technology/ internet for these purposes. Students can hurt themselves physically when performing social media challenges or they may harm themselves or others with the anonymous communications apps and the information or media they choose to post.

Below are two websites to support conversations about internet safety. The first site offers introductory tips to help parents start conversations with their children. The second site is comprehensive, covering a wide range of topics. The third site offers information about bullying including cyberbullying, a common result when students use anonymous communication apps.

The dangers of AI use by students

AI, or artificial intelligence, is rapidly becoming a part of our everyday lives. While it can be beneficial in certain areas, there are some risks involved when it comes to students using AI to write their papers. In this blog post, we will explore the dangers of AI-written papers and why students should avoid using AI to write their papers. We will look at potential issues such as plagiarism, lack of creativity, and the lack of the ability to think critically. By the end of this blog post, readers will have a better understanding of why using AI to write papers should be avoided.

AI-written papers are becoming increasingly popular among students who are looking for an easy way to get their academic assignments done quickly. While AI can be a useful tool in certain situations, it's important to consider the potential consequences of using AI to write your school papers.

The above five paragraphs were generated in less than 1 minute utilizing an AI blog-writing website! The website only needed a topic sentence and several keywords in order to complete five paragraphs in a matter of seconds! The writing can be identified as AI-generated and in almost every single case, teachers can identify the lack of "student voice." I hope this short experiment alerts you of yet another new technology available to our students that has many hidden dangers pertaining to the learning and development of our children.
