Class of 2023 Stats

- 1. 79% of our senior class is attending college or university training (26% Private Universities, 46% Public Universities, and 7% Community Colleges). 3 out of 4 of our students attending Community College are attending MCC, from On the Spot Admission.
- 2. 10% of our senior class is going into the trades. These trades include: Local 104 Electrical, Local 103 Construction, Automotive, Carpentry, EMT, and Plumbing.

Summer Reading & Math he Importance of Summer Reading

Summer is here. Please remember to keep up the reading routine at home! Summer reading is crucial for maintaining the hard work students have accomplished this academic school year. According to the US Department of Education, students experience learning loss or "summer slide" if they don't read and engage with books continually during the summer vacation. Not only is summer reading important for the practice of decoding skills (sounding out the words) and fluency (reading with phrasing so that the reading sounds like talking), but also for knowledge building (building knowledge and understanding of the world). This is why it is beneficial to also read to your child and discuss new concepts and vocabulary. Do you know that according to recent reading research, knowledge building is key to creating competency in reading and can partially compensate for lower decoding skills? Of course the strongest readers are those with strong decoding skills and listening comprehension. In addition, as you read aloud, you can model metacognitive processes you use as a reader, such as pausing and reflecting on your understanding of the text, and identifying unfamiliar vocabulary words. Pick a family reading time, if that works for you, when everyone in your house stops what they are doing and reads. Maybe, you want to pick a favorite book from your childhood to read aloud. This summer, encourage your child to read, and enjoy reading to them. Not only is it good for their reading development, but it is also a pleasant bonding experience!

Raising Multicultural Kids (RMK)



This year with Raising Multicultural Kids, the students of Lillian M. Jacobs School explored the depths of what it means to be stronger TOGETHER.

In Raising Multicultural Kids' "Diversity In Classroom Leadership and Literature" program (1-5), students and teachers were inspired by the numerous true stories that showed them persistence through problems and the transforming powers of a growth mindset that changes challenges into possibilities. They celebrated their similarities and differences: their talents, traditions, families, and cultures that make each of them unique. The students reflected on when we value each other's differences, we are stronger as a classroom, school, and community.

One of the true stories that inspired RMK's "Diversity In Classroom Leadership and Literature" students to be advocates for change was "The Water Princess," a book based on supermodel Georgie Badiel's childhood. Students learned about the 3 Rs - Recycle, Reduce and Reuse, and brainstormed ways to implement the 3 Rs in their everyday life. They received 2 water droplets - one to educate other students at school and one to educate their caregivers at home. They learned that through educating others they can become advocates for clean water in their community.

For the first time, Raising Multicultural Kids' "Littlest Inclusive Learners" (PreK-K) had their own books and lessons. They completed a five-month long project, a classroom community quilt. Each student made their own quilt square that represented themselves, their family, and their community. Just like them, each quilt square was beautifully unique, and when they came TOGETHER, they made a masterpiece. Later in the year, the students explored what it means to be a good citizen and upstander of their classroom, school, and greater community.

Both Raising Multicultural Kids' "Littlest Inclusive Learners" and "Diversity In Classroom Leadership and Literature" students demonstrated that when they value each persons' contributions and work TOGETHER, they can accomplish anything!

INTERFACE

Hull Public Schools has partnered with William James College to bring INTERFACE, a free outpatient mental health referral service program, to students in the district and all Hull residents. The program is designed to easily connect students and residents with outpatient mental health and wellness resources and providers.

Students and residents who choose to take advantage of the program will go through the following process:

- Intake: Participants will speak with an INTERFACE resource and referral counselor for 15-20 minutes and provide important information to ensure a successful match with outpatient mental health provider options.
- Making a match: A resource and referral counselor assigned to the participant will review a database of over 9,000 licensed and vetted providers to find a match. INTERFACE strives to match participants with mental health professionals and practices that best meet their needs, insurance or fee requirement, specialty request, location, availability and more.
- Providing matches: Once a provider match has been identified (generally within 3 weeks of the initial call), the resource and referral counselor will give participants the provider's information so they can schedule with this provider.
- **Following up:** The resource and referral counselor will follow up within one to two weeks of participants receiving the match to ensure they've been able to connect.
- Closing a referral: Once there is a successful match, the resource and referral counselor will close the referral process.
 If participants need additional support in the future, they can always call the helpline again.

The service is available Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m and Tuesday and Thursday from 8 am. to 6 p.m. To access the service, which began Feb. 1, call 888-244-6843. The Helpline is staffed by mental health professionals.

Funding for this initiative was provided to Hull by a Supporting Students' Social Emotional Learning, Behavioral and Mental Health and Wellness grant from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.
