6.0 Superintendent's Business Items

6.1 Students with MCAS Perfect Scores

Mr. Devine asked the principals to introduce their students who had perfect MCAS scores. Ms. Christine Cappadona, Jacobs Elementary School Principal, Mr. Anthony Hrivnak, Memorial School Principal and Dr. Paula Girouard McCann, Hull High School Principal, recognized the following students who received perfect MCAS scores.

William Noonan earned a perfect score in Grade 3 mathematics
Elsie Harper earned a perfect score in Grade 4 English language arts
Parry Harper earned a perfect score in Grade 7 mathematics
Kacee McKinney earned a perfect score in Grade 8 English language arts
Benjamin Fenelon earned a perfect score in Grade 10 English language arts
Daniel Kraus earned a perfect score in Grade 9 Introductory Physics

School Committee members congratulated the students for such an achievement.

6.2 Professional Development Overview

Ms. Judith Kuehn, Assistant Superintendent for Student Services and Curriculum, gave an overview of the 2017-2018 Professional Development. The topics included the following:

- Curriculum and Instruction
- Technology
- Safe Supportive School Climate
- Special Education/Regular Education Intervention/English Language Education
- Induction Programs
- Leadership Retreats

Ms. Kuehn explained that professional development is connected from year to year and it is designed to help teacher that have a need for a certain topic. She said that she has learned from staff that they like being able to pick and choose which offerings and modules they will attend at the November 6, 2017.

6.3 Calm Classroom

Ms. Judy Kuehn, Assistant Superintendent and Ms. Christine Cappadona, Jacobs School Principal, explained that all teachers have been trained in Calm Classroom, which includes activities such as; breathing, stretching, relaxation and focusing. The district wide initiative will start at tier one for all students pre-k to 12, and include an activity two times a day at

each grade level. Counselors are encouraged to us it after a discipline session. Ms. Cappadona lead the School Committee through one of the Calm Classroom activities, which had participants place a penny on their foreheads and concentrate on being calm and still so the penny wouldn't fall off. When the activity was over Ms. Cappadona explained that research shows that 81% of students re more calm and 24% have more focus after doing a calm classroom activity and she is excited about rolling this out.

6.4 Administrations Preliminary FY19 Budget

Mr. David DeGennaro, School Business Administrator, gave a presentation on the FY19 proposed administration budget, which included the following:

- Continuous progress
- FY19 budget overview
- FY19 proposed budget amount
- Sources of funds
- Historical grant funding
- FY19 forecast by cost center
- Next steps
- Meeting the needs of all students

Committee members commented on the layout of the budget and said they wanted something like it for a long time. Mr. Devine told the Committee that the amount we are requesting of 3.17% is higher than Town Manager's 2.25%. Mr. DeGennaro explained that offsets are less than in the past, including 52% less in grants. Mr. Devine added that they were just informed today that the MSBA denied our application and we will not receive funding necessary repairs at Memorial and Hull High School. Mr. Devine stated that this budget includes one special educator at the middle school and a district-wide .5 behavior specialist, AP Spanish texts and science curriculum.

7.0 School Committee Business Items

7.1 School Committee Goals

The Committee discussed the need for School Committee goals and the pros and cons of having a subcommittee versus the whole committee, along with the difference between Superintendent/staff goals and School Committee goals. It was decided that Mr. Twombly would send Ms. Ollerhead the document that he and Ms. Huxtable worked on and she would include it in the next packet and then at the next meeting the committee could discuss how to proceed.

7.2 Discussion of Budget Planning Committee Model

Ms. Fleming informed the rest of the Committee that she spoke to MASC executive director, Glen Koocher, who stated that he sent a survey to Massachusetts School Committee's asking if they used a subcommittee or full committee for budget and he said 16 districts responded and 12 used full committees and 4 had budget subcommittees. She ask him if he had an opinion and he told her that when you do your budget as a whole it will keep peace in the house and if you present as a full committee you are going to have a stronger budget and be able to defend it. The Committee discussed the pros and cons, including their thoughts and reasons for those thoughts on the topic. It was decided that the Committee would temporarily disband the budget subcommittee meetings for the remainder of this fiscal year and discuss budget as a full

Committee and then discuss the topic again at the summer retreat.
