STUDENT COURSE EXPECTATIONS 2018-2019

A.P. ENGLISH LITERATURE AND COMPOSITION

Course Overview

The A.P. English course in Literature and Composition is a college-level course that trains students to become skilled readers of literature written in a variety of periods and genres. Close readings of selected works of mainly British and American writers dating from the seventeenth century to post-modern pieces, are combined with extensive writing and revision of analytical essays. A major goal of this course is to help students develop critical standards for interpreting literature while attaining stylistic maturity of expression in writing. Research skills are stressed to prepare students for success in college. A minimum of three analytic research papers will be assigned per year. Students will also complete their college essays at the beginning of the academic year.

Course Objectives

Students will examine literary works and discuss theme, characterization, plot, and other literary elements. Students will write focused compositions, developing logically related ideas and adequate supporting details. Students will edit personal writing and that of their peers on google docs.

Course Content

Literature: analysis, research, and interpretations of representative works from various genres and time periods Language: literary terminology, vocabulary within readings, vocabulary commonly found on the A.P. exam

Writing: literary analysis using persuasive/expository/narrative/descriptive writing forms

Speaking: oral presentations

A.P. Exam Preparation: multiple open response, prose analysis, and poetry analysis essays
