RMK's Advocacy In Action

Memorial Middle School and Raising Multicultural Kids' Advocacy in Action (AIA) program provides a platform to develop youth voices by fostering an understanding of identity development and the value of community. Students in AIA have gained a greater understanding of the self and others while learning to appreciate the diversity in their community and beyond. The students at AIA had been working diligently on the topic of identity, particularly as it pertains to their past, present, and future self. Students examine biological, cultural, role, and perceived factors that influence their understanding of self and how these aspects shape both behavior and lived experiences.

Students created a Mandala Art Project encompassing their past, present, and future identities in symbols, while also exploring Indian culture. The students researched, printed, and drew symbols of their choice to illustrate the evolution of their identity. With the knowledge obtained about identity, the students prepared to interview two adults for inspiration. The first adult was Kelly Lamb, co-founder of Raising Multicultural Kids (RMK), a white,

affluent, middle-aged woman who grew up in public housing and has a diverse family structure. The second adult was Boston College Professor of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, Angela Clark, a black, affluent, middle-aged woman who grew up in a middle-class household. The students prepared thoughtful questions and practiced with a mock Q&A with MMS Social Worker, Ms. MacDonald, and Social Work intern, Ms. Pearl. The practice helped students learn to ask deep, respectful, and appropriate personal questions about another person. At the meeting with Kelly and Angela, the students asked each woman questions about their past, present, and future, with the goals of understanding how identities change overtime, the influence/limitations a person has on shaping their identity, and the power of self-compassion. Students left the meeting empowered with a deeper understanding of how identities change overtime, how lived experiences shape our present and future self, and some ideas as to what fosters resilience. The presenters and guests in attendance were very impressed with the student's engagement and powerful questions. AlA students are now preparing for end-of-year student-led event to foster community and respect for differences.
