- Assure the safety and security of our buildings
- Meet changing DESE curriculum requirements
- Continue with digital learning opportunities
- Build capacity for special education programs
- Fund ongoing professional development
- Offer athletics and co-curricular opportunities
- Implement new Massachusetts History and Social
   Science frameworks (grade PreK-12)



# Strategic Plan Objective 1

- Foster independent learning to promote creative and enthusiastic learners
  - Create curriculum maps that identify opportunities for personalized learning
  - Track alumni success in higher education and the workplace to identify trends
- Students will embrace diversity and change to allow them to be successful in global society
  - Provide professional development for all teachers regarding diversity
  - Review existing curriculum maps to identify where teaching about and exposure to diversity is already taking place, and increase these opportunities



# Strategic Plan Objective 2

- Implement an individual learning plan for all students
  - Create individual learning plan committee
  - Create process and timeline for implementation of individual learning plans
  - Educate parents / guardians about individual learning plans
- Review and expand the high school internship program
  - Identify students in grades 9-11 that have interest in an internship
  - Identify businesses willing to take on an intern
  - Develop list of Hull High School Alumni willing to assist or willing to accept interns



# Strategic Plan Objective 3

- Review current curricula for alignment to the Massachusetts frameworks
  - Create a rubric to use for review of all current curriculum maps
  - Review and revise current curriculum maps as appropriate
  - Provide professional development opportunities for teachers to update curriculum maps
- Review recruiting and hiring practices to ensure highly qualified, talented educators
  - Contact local college career centers to assist with recruiting and hiring practices
  - Implement consistent recruiting practices that seek out highly qualified, talented individuals
  - Discuss ways to increase educator diversity with local college diversity organizations



# Strategic Plan Objective 4

- Strengthen use of data in decision making
  - Examine student data from multiple sources to assess professional development needs
  - Examine student data to increase attendance rates
  - Examine student data to decide where additional student supports are needed
- Continue to build a cohesive district wide plan to meet the social emotional needs of all students
  - Create Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) team to facilitate implementation of social and emotional learning strategies in our schools
  - Ensure all teachers are incorporating social and emotional learning techniques in their classrooms
  - Assess effectiveness of staffing levels and practices







### Student Opportunity Act

- Passed by the Legislature and signed into law by Governor Baker last month
- Impacts for Hull uncertain and probably less than some numbers being floated
- There is an evidence based reporting requirement
- Potential for an increase in Chapter 70 Aid and increase in special education transportation reimbursement and increased funding for ELL services
- This budget does not reflect any increases in aid in these areas because the funding source for these increases is still uncertain
- As details become clearer, we will update the committee and community


